PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE JULY 2020

To all SNGMS Members:

Another month without a General Meeting. I, like all of you, am tired of the confinement, but I am focused on finally making cabochons from the 3 giant crates of slabs that I have accumulated or cut. Some of these slabs have been in the crate for years so it is like a fun grab-bag experience.

As you will see from the minutes of the last Board of Directors meeting, we are going through our sweep account funds much faster than in previous years. This is due to the temporary closure of the shop, then add to it the fact that we haven't had a raffle, which happens at our General Meetings. Bottom line, we are in fund raising mode. We increased our machine usage to \$6.00 per hour. This commenced on July 3rd. Next, we increased out basic class fee to \$7.00 per class (faceting class has its own schedule of charges). The class fee change starts on August 1st. We don't want to disturb our principal balance in our bond account as these earnings is what helps keep the shop afloat. Another way we are raising funds is to auction off, to our members, surplus equipment. Last month we auctioned off the red mixer to Lamar Holt, who is going to use it as a really big rock tumbler. Way to go Lamar! On the block this month is the tile saw, along with a tumbler base. Come down to the shop and check this item out. Bill and I have a tile saw that we use to trim slabs and it doubles as a lawn waterer since I lost the guard that keeps the water from shooting out the back.

Also discussed at the Board Meeting was the Federation Show and Convention, which we are hosting in 2022. We have a plan in place to hold our annual show at the Spring Jamboree, however, we are actively researching all other options. The problems we are running into is the fact that some of the prospective sites are inaccessible due to various Covid-19 closures. Thusly I am reaching out to all of our members to add to this think tank by sending in your ideas and suggestions on realistic sites, venues, etc. We need to look at all aspects:

RV park/camping close to venue

Cost. The final budget must equal or better the one in place.

<u>Treasurers Report:</u> Account Balances were reported. And profit and loss statement for the club was reviewed.

Shop report:

All equipment is up and running well.

<u>Unfinished business</u>: There will be no general meeting for July as the Eagles is still closed and under Phase II of the state reopening plan can not have over 50 people in attendance.

New Business:

Sheri Johnson reported on the Federation show held in Big Piney WY. Our website received 2nd place many thanks to Lorilee Stackhouse for doing an awesome job as webmaster. Recommendations for Adult and Junior rock hounds of the year are requested. Please submit any recommendations to a board member.

It was proposed by Chops that the charge for shop usage be raised from \$.50 per 10 minutes to \$.60 per 10 minutes. This increase is needed to help offset rising costs in both rent and insurance. 2020 Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Society (RMFMS) Annual Convention Report

Hello Fellow Rockhounds!

Let me apologize in advance for the length of this article – SNGMS will be hosting the RMFMS Annual Meeting in 2022 and we are already starting preparations for the event.

I would like to thank all of the SNGMS members who made the trek to Big Piney, Wyoming, June 18 through June 21. Other than the local Sublette County residents, I think 16 SNGMS members that went to the show were the largest single group of attendees. Jim Gray, the show chairperson for the Sublette County Rock Hounds (SCRH), greatly appreciated our support, the club put a lot of work into the show and it was nice that so many Las Vegas members made the trip.

The Collecting Trips

Big Piney is nicknamed the "icebox of the US" because it has one of the coldest climates among inhabited locations in the Lower 48 (Wikipedia). The first night after we arrived, the temperature dropped down to freezing. During the days, the temperature was in the mid 60's. Needless to say, it was perfect rock hounding weather and the show included some great collecting trips.

Day One (Thursday) - Big Piney is near the Green River formation that is famous for its fish fossils and there are several fee sites that will allow you to find your own. Fifteen cars ventured out to Fossil Safari in Lincoln County to "go fishing". The staff spent a few minutes explaining how to split the rock and then we spent the next 4 hours hammering away. It was a great trip and everyone found fish fossils. This was the only collecting trip that I could attend during the show.



Day Two (Friday) – Fifty-seven people drove out the collect Blue Forest petrified wood. The petrified wood that others brought back was beautiful.

The Fish fossil dealer was demonstrating how to preserve our finds and there was a flint knapper showing how the local Indians would make arrowheads.

<u>Birthstones for the Month of July is Ruby</u>: Ruby is a pink to blood-red colored gemstone, a variety of the mineral corundum (aluminium oxide). Ruby is one of the traditional cardinal gems, together with amethyst, sapphire, emerald, and diamond. The word *ruby* comes from *ruber*, Latin for red. The color of a ruby is due to the element chromium. A clear stone will command a premium, but a ruby without any needle-like rutile inclusions may indicate that the stone has been treated. Ruby Symbolizes love and passion. The Stone is associated with vitality and strong




Finding the Shop Location

We had a great turn out (nineteen) for the chemistry lesson by Mr. Bart Soloman. He discussed the different citric and vinegar acids on sedimentary rock. The kids, dressed in masks, gloves, etc. also got to do their own testing. Very educational.

This months program will be about fossils. The kids will get to make their own fossil imprints, fossil beds using clay, Plaster-Of-Paris, water, sand and an assortment of fossils. Should be a great time!





Shop Talk: Brad's Bench Tips

SHEET & WIRE STORAGE

The more you work with jewelry, the more problems you have finding the piece of metal you need. My pieces of sheet were generally stored in various plastic bags, and the wire was in separate coils. Few were marked, so it often took me a while to locate that piece of 26 ga fine sheet I bought last year, especially since I usually take my supplies back and forth to classes.

A tip from a friend helped me organize everything. I bought an expanding file folder from the office supplies store (the kind that has 13 slots and a folding cover) and marked the tabs for each gauge of metal I use. Then I marked all my pieces of sheet with their gauge, put them in plastic bags, marked the gauge on the bag, and popped them into the folder. I usually store coils of wire loose in the folder, but they can also be bagged if you prefer. I use one tab for bezel wire and one for the odd, miscellaneous items.

The resulting folder is really convenient when I want to take my metal out to a class or workshop, and it's colorful enough for me to easily find in the clutter of the shop!



LITTLE BALLS

I often use little balls of silver and gold as accent pieces on my designs. They can be made as needed from pieces of scrap. Cut the scrap into little pieces, put them on a solder pad and melt them with a torch. Then throw the balls into a small cup of pickle.



If you need to make all the balls the same size, you need the same amount of metal to melt each time. The best way to do that is to clip equal lengths of wire.
